THE PARTNERS

The Trauma Treatment Training Center (TTTC) is a collaboration of the Mayerson Center for Safe and Healthy Children and The Childhood Trust at Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center (CCHMC). The Mayerson Center for Safe and Healthy Children is a child advocacy center dedicated to prevention, evaluation, treatment, and research about child abuse and neglect. The center includes physicians, psychologists, social workers, nurses, child protection workers, and law enforcement professionals. The Childhood Trust is a joint effort of CCHMC and the University of Cincinnati that offers training and consultation on the intervention and treatment of child abuse and family violence.

PURPOSE

The purpose of the TTTC is to develop expertise in transferring evidence-based and evidence-informed treatments for traumatized children and adolescents to community mental health providers. This is accomplished through a cycle-based dissemination method designed to transfer evidence-based treatments through training and follow-up consultation, while continually refining the treatments in real world settings through clinician feedback.

MULTI-LEVEL COLLABORATION

In addition to training and providing follow-up consultation to clinicians, the TTTC works with agency supervisors to implement the model, maintain fidelity to the model, and build training capacity within the agency. The TTTC collaborates with agency administrators around issues of fiscal management and sustainability, as well as with third party payers to authorize models as billable therapies to ensure agency reimbursement.

Parent-Child Interaction Therapy Applications (PCIT-A)

PROGRAM BACKGROUND

Parent-Child Interaction Therapy (PCIT) is an evidence-based treatment supported by over 20 years of research and practice by PCIT practitioners and researchers throughout the United States (www.pcit.org). PCIT is a mastery-based therapy that averages 14 sessions. The intervention uses a two-stage approach aimed at relationship enhancement (Child Directed Interaction or CDI) and child behavior management (Parent Directed Interaction or PDI). PCIT focuses on improving the caregiver-child relationship and increasing children's positive behaviors. Parent-Child Interaction Therapy Applications (PCIT-A) is based on PCIT. PCIT-A was designed to increase flexibility for individual client populations.

TARGET POPULATION

Originally, PCIT was developed for children aged 2 to 7 with disruptive behaviors and their caregivers. PCIT-A has been increasingly utilized with families in which children have been maltreated or exposed to domestic violence. PCIT-A training can be adapted for children aged 7-12 and for nonfamily caregivers such as foster parents, residential treatment center staff, Head Start teachers, and others.

STAFF SELECTION AND TRAINING

PCIT-A training consists of 35 hours of classroom work delivered in two 3-day trainings that are separated by 3-4 weeks, followed by clinical consultation on initial cases. Consultation will be provided by trainers via teleconference at set times each week for any trainee who wants to participate. Consultation can also be provided through the review of session videotapes by trainers.

CEUs

Attendees receive 35 Counselor or Social Worker CEUs through the Ohio Counselor, Social Worker and Marriage & Family Therapist Board or Ohio psychologists receive 30 CE credits from the Ohio Psychological Association.

Child-Adult Relationship Enhancement (CARE)

PROGRAM BACKGROUND

Child-Adult Relationship Enhancement (CARE) is a trauma-informed, field-initiated modification of specific PCIT skills for general usage by non-clinical adults who interact with traumatized children. CARE utilizes the 3 P skills (Praise, Paraphrase and Play-by-Play) to connect with children, a set of techniques for giving children effective positive commands, and selective ignoring techniques to redirect problematic behaviors. CARE also contains a trauma education component to contextualize the use of these skills with the kinds of behaviors and problems exhibited by traumatized children.

TARGET POPULATION

CARE can be used with children of all ages and ethnicities who have experienced trauma. CARE can be generalized to a wide variety of settings and implemented at different levels of intensity. CARE is supported by pragmatic evidence of its effectiveness.

STAFF SELECTION AND TRAINING

CARE training is offered in two forms based on agency setting, client population, and agency goals.

1) Basic CARE:

- 3 hour training
- Includes demonstrations and active skills-building practice

2) Expanded CARE:

- 6 hour training
- Includes demonstrations, active skills-building practice, live coaching and mastery testing

CEUs

Child Forensic Interviewer Training

PROGRAM BACKGROUND

The Child Forensic Training Institute, founded in 1998, trains professionals in the forensic interviewing of children. It offers both Dr. Thomas Lyon's adaptation of the evidence-based, NICHD structured protocol and the Childhood Trust Flexible Guidelines for interviewing. Skills-building training on the use of interview aids such as the Cognitive Interview, the Touch Survey, anatomical drawings, and anatomical dolls are also presented and practiced.

TARGET POPULATION

Child Forensic Interviewer Training is intended for a wide range of professionals who interview children about suspected child abuse.

STAFF SELECTION AND TRAINING

Child Forensic Interviewer Training consists of 35 hours of classroom work over 5 days. The training includes lectures and practice interviews with non-abused children and adults portraying allegedly abused children. These interviews are videotaped and reviewed by faculty and peers, and include mock trial practice. Small group discussions provide ample opportunity for interaction among trainees and nationally recognized peers and researchers. This training highlights cutting-edge, practical information and promotes interdisciplinary collaboration. Multidisciplinary teams are welcome.

CEUs

Attendees receive 30 Counselor or Social Worker CEUs through the Ohio Counselor, Social Worker and Marriage & Family Therapist Board.

TF-CBT Reduces:

- Intrusive memories, thoughts or dreams about the trauma
- Avoidance of trauma reminders
- Emotional numbing
- Physical and psychological hyper-arousal
- Significant impairments in daily living



TF-CBT has been adapted to address the needs unique to Latino and hearing-impaired/deaf populations, and for children who are experiencing traumatic grief.



Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (TF-CBT)

PROGRAM BACKGROUND

Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (TF-CBT) is an evidence-based treatment developed and tested by Drs. Esther Deblinger, Judith Cohen, and Anthony Mannarino to help children and their caregivers overcome the negative effects of traumatic life events. TF-CBT is a clinic-based, short-term treatment that teaches children skills in stress management, cognitive processing, communication, problem solving, and safety. It is essential that the child's primary caregiver participates in the treatment in order to enhance parenting skills and manage caregivers' own reactions to the child's trauma.

TARGET POPULATION

TF-CBT is intended for caregivers and their children ages 3 to 18 who have experienced traumatic life events, such as sexual abuse, traumatic bereavement, natural disasters, or domestic violence. TF-CBT targets posttraumatic stress disorder (PTSD) symptoms, depression, behavioral problems, and other issues commonly experienced by traumatized children. Typically lasting 12-16 sessions, TF-CBT consists of two phases: 1) individual sessions with the child and caregiver; and 2) joint caregiver-child sessions.

STAFF SELECTION AND TRAINING

Trainees should be Master's level clinicians in order to attend this training. TF-CBT training consists of 12 hours of classroom work over 2 days. Follow-up consultation will be provided by trainers.

Attendees receive 12 Counselor or Social Worker CEUs through the Ohio Counselor, Social Worker and Marriage & Family Therapist Board. Ohio psychologists receive 12 CE credits from the Ohio Psychological Association.

The goal of this intervention is to enable children to remember and cope with previously troubling thoughts and feelings about death and go on to have more positive and comforting memories about the deceased person.

Childhood Traumatic Grief Therapy

PROGRAM BACKGROUND

Childhood Traumatic Grief Therapy draws from a variety of different evidence-based treatment models that deal with traumatic grief. This intervention is the result of collaboration within the National Child Traumatic Stress Network (NCTSN). This model is based on a specific sequence: 1) a trauma-focused phase; and 2) a grief-focused phase. Childhood Traumatic Grief Therapy includes 12-16 individual sessions for the child and caregiver, with joint caregiver-child sessions at appropriate times.

TARGET POPULATION

Childhood traumatic grief can develop following the traumatic death of a significant person in the child's life. However, in some cases, childhood traumatic grief can result from a death that most would consider expected or normal, such as death from illness or natural causes. Children experiencing traumatic grief have reactions similar to those found in children with PTSD. These reactions make it difficult for the child to follow the usual path of bereavement and reminisce about the deceased person in a positive and meaningful way. If not treated, childhood traumatic grief can affect children's development, relationships, achievement, and later effectiveness in life.

STAFF SELECTION AND TRAINING

Childhood Traumatic Grief Therapy consists of 6 hours of training. The training is intended for all professionals who work with school-age children and adolescents who are dealing with the traumatic death of a significant person in their lives. Additional information and resources are provided for working with young children and groups.

CEUs

Psychological First Aid

PROGRAM BACKGROUND

Psychological First Aid was developed by the Terrorism and Disaster Branch of the National Child Traumatic Stress Network (NCSTN) and the National Center for PTSD. Psychological First Aid is an evidence-informed modular approach for assisting children, adolescents, adults, and families in the immediate aftermath of disasters and terrorism. Psychological First Aid is designed to reduce the initial distress caused by traumatic events, and to foster short- and long-term adaptive functioning. Principles and techniques of Psychological First Aid meet four basic standards: 1) consistent with research evidence on risk and resilience following trauma; 2) applicable and practical in field settings; 3) appropriate to developmental levels across the lifespan; and 4) culturally informed and adaptable.

TARGET POPULATION

Psychological First Aid is intended for children and adults of all ages who have experienced disasters or terrorism.

STAFF SELECTION AND TRAINING

This 3 hour training is intended for mental health professionals providing assistance to children and families as part of an organized disaster response.

CEUs

SPECIALIZED PEER REVIEW TRAINING

This one-day specialized, skills-building training reviews recent research findings and presents newly developed, brief techniques to open up interviewer questions and maintain this invitational approach over time. During this training attendees will learn and practice skills-building with two peer review forms that have shown good inter-rater reliability on over 100 actual child forensic interviews. The "kinds of questions" form enables peer review teams to enumerate in real time the questions interviewers use by observing live interviews or videotapes. The "art of interviewing" form assesses 10 interviewer qualities (e.g. rapport building, developmental sensitivity, neutrality of tone and attitude, consistency of response, and overall interview rating), using a 5-point Likert scale.
